Chosen by the teaching team, Ernesto was awarded the computer on March 17<sup>th</sup> 2015. There were smiles, handshakes and kisses.

A brilliant student, Ernesto has been a Juntos student at the Josefa site for many years, and knows every single one of the programmes taught. Nevertheless, he keeps coming to the sessions where he uses the Internet and does his homework. He is enrolled at a


technical high school called the CONALEP, with a specialty in food and drink. Already in his fourth semester, this honour student has a scholarship from the school because of his high grade point average, 9.6 out of a possible 10. A year from now, in the spring of 2016, he will have completed the 6<sup>th</sup> and last semester at the *preparatoria*, the high school where he is studying.

Upon completion of his studies, he will get several certificates, his secondary certificate (*certificado de preparatoria*), his bachelor certificate (*certificado de bachillerato*) and a technical certificate in gastronomy. This semester, his fourth, he will do his social service and during the last two semesters, he will complete the practicum, where he will spend time working in a restaurant in Cuernavaca. At present the teaching team is looking into how he could do his compulsory social service semester working in the community with Juntos. Updates on Ernesto will be forthcoming.

Ernesto plans to attend university, the ULA in Cuernavaca, to get his next degree and hopes to become a chef. In an ideal world he would like to become a doctor, an anesthetist, but since his parents cannot help him and he works right now to pay his own expenses, that is not possible. Because he is very good in math, he earns money by working at Kumon, the world's largest after school math and reading programme. He got the job at Kumon about two years ago when he walked in and wanted to take courses. The owner told him what the fees were and when Ernesto explained that he did not have the means, the owner very intelligently suggested that if Ernesto was good enough, he could work there.

Ernesto has three siblings and he and his younger sisters, aged 14 and 12, have all attended Juntos classes. In the picture at right, his youngest sister, Sandy Anahi, is seen working away. She seems as bright as he is and was totally oblivious her picture was being taken.

The picture below shows Iris, one of the Juntos teachers, working with a boy with reduced eyesight. Although the boy wears glasses and manages with them, he had forgotten them. Instead of sending him home, Iris simply read out the assignment so he could continue learning.





2. One of the goals of Juntos is to enable students to get and keep good jobs. To that end Juntos provides courses on many software programs, Word, Excel, MovieMaker and more, but one that was lacking was web site creation. In order to bring this skill to the Juntos students, two steps are necessary. Right now only the first step is in place. In February and March the five Juntos teachers took a course on how to develop websites using Wix, a free platform. The next step will be to teach the students that attend the Juntos classes how to do so. We hope that making, and later maintaining websites, will provide jobs in the future.

Under the guidance of Gerardo Jaime and Katy Barnhart, the five Juntos teachers attended four three hour long workshops and on March 10, 2015, presented what they had learned at the Graham's house in Cuernavaca. The resulting website is very impressive. Please click on the link to see it.
